

Introduction

Between the years of 1850 and 1868, almost Ten Thousand Convicts were transported to Western Australia, aboard Forty-three Vessels.

By order of the Home Government, the Surgeon Superintendent aboard each vessel was required to keep an accurate account of all events which took place during the voyage.

This, the Journal Alexander Watson M.D., Surgeon Superintendent, records the events which took place each day on board the Convict Ship "Norwood", which, with its most valuable cargo of 290 Male Convicts, made passage from England to Western Australia in the year of 1862.

When reading this transcript, it is important to note that:-

- (a) Page numbers provided herein, bear no relationship to the original Journal - They have been put in place purely to allow indexing. A prepared index showing the names of all persons mentioned in the text can be found on the following page.

This is to certify the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that the following is a correct Account of the Issue and Expenditure of the several Articles put on board the "Norwood" Convict Ship, Frank Bristow, Master, from Her Majesty's Victualling Yards for the comfort of the Guard, their wives and families, and the Convicts during the voyage from England to Western Australia, between the 28th February and the 11th June 1862; the following articles were issued over and above the regular Daily Rations:-

RULES AND REGULATIONS

To be observed by the Prisoners on board the "Norwood", Male Convict Ship, by order of the Surgeon Superintendent.

Signed: A. Watson M.D.

1. The Prisoners must conduct themselves in a respectful and becoming manner to all the Officers on Board and they are strictly to obey such orders as I may issue through the Captain of Divisions and Heads of Messes.
2. The Prisoners must behave themselves in a decent and becoming manner at all times but more especially when Prayers are read to them or Divine Service performed. Prayers morning and evening weather permitting.
3. Cursing and all foul language, shouting, quarreling, fighting, selling, exchanging or giving away clothes are strictly prohibited.
4. Any person stealing or secreting any of the Mess Stores any other article belonging to the Mess or the Ship will be severely punished.
5. The Prisoners are on no occasion to hold conversation with the Guard or Ships Company or talk through the bars below.
6. Each Mess shall have a Captain and 2nd Captain and it will be the business of one man in his turn to clean the Mess Utensils, the latter after each meal are to be taken on Deck and thoroughly cleansed and dried before being passed below. The members of each Mess are to sit together.
7. The Captains of Messes are warned that they will be held responsible for the good order and cleanliness of their Messes, they are to see that the men wash themselves every morning and that they attend to their hair and that there are no stragglers at night and no one sleeping with their clothes on.
8. Smoking or striking lights of any kind in the Prison, washing clothes or attempting to dry them will not be allowed under any pretence.
9. The Captains of Messes will receive their provisions in the order of their Messes, they are to tally the pieces of meat and deliver them to the Cooks, they are also to receive Water for their Messes.
10. Two Inspectors in rotation will be appointed who will superintend the issue of provisions. A printed copy of the established rations of provisions will be hung up and should they appear of bad quality or deficient in weight they are to submit them for examination to me before they pass the Quarter Deck after that it will be too late to complain.
11. The Night Watch will be set at 8 o'clock and they will be held responsible for the peace and good order of the Prison during the Night, and it will be their duty to see that no more than one person at a time is in the Water Closet.
Prisoners are warned that if found congregating at the bottom of the ladders leading to the Water Closet, they will be punished. Should anything unusual occur they are immediately to report to the sentry at the gate.
12. The bedding is to be taken on Deck every morning, the weather will permit. The Captains of Divisions are to see the beds neatly rolled up by 5.30 A.M. after which they must be handed through the Prison gate to the Upper Deck Crew to be stored by them and when they are ordered down they are to be received from the same party.
13. If at any time a Prisoner has reason to complain of provoking language or treatment from the Ships Company or Guard he is strictly forbidden to retaliate, but to make the same known to me that the complaint may be investigated.

14. Each Captain of a Division will have charge of a certain number of Messes. The first division to consist of 12 Messes, Second division to consist of 12 Messes and the Third division to consist of 12 Messes. He is to attend to every man in his Division and see that they muster clean and orderly. The Captains are to attend to the cleaning of the Prison to check any impropriety they may witness and to report to me everything that may affect the discipline established.

15. The Surgeon Superintendent has to impress on the minds of the Prisoners that their future prosperity and happiness will depend on their good conduct on board and the report he shall have to make to the Governor of the Colony on arrival.

- 4.00 A.M. Prisoner Cooks, 3 in number, admitted on Deck, at 5.30 the Captains of Divisions and Upper Deck admitted on deck for the purpose of filling washing tubs and Prisoners at the same time to commence taking up their beds and Hammocks.
- 6.00 A.M. One half the Prisoners admitted for washing their persons under the supervision of their respective Captains half an hour being allowed for this purpose.
- 7.00 A.M. Second half mustered on deck.
- 7.30 A.M. Down all Prisoners. Ships Company to commence washing Upper Deck and Water Closets.
- 8.00 A.M. Breakfast.
- 8.30 A.M. One man from each Mess admitted on Deck for the purpose of washing up their Mess utensils.
- 9.00 A.M. All the Prisoners admitted on Deck with the exception of two men in each Mess who in rotation will clean and scrape dry the Prison Deck and their berths, the bottom boards of the latter being removed, during which time I will attend in the Surgery and see Sick.
- 9.30 A.M. Prison inspected after which all the Prisoners will be assembled for Prayers.
- 10.00 A.M. One half of the Prisoners sent on Deck for exercise, the other half being arranged in Schools under the Superintendence of the Religious Instructor assisted by Monitors.
- 11.30 A.M. Schools to break up. Captains of Divisions and Inspectors of Provisions to be present at the Issuing of Lime Juice.
- Noon. Dinner.
- 12.30 P.M. From each Mess one man to be admitted on Deck for the purpose of washing Mess utensils.
- 1.20 P.M. Deck to be swept up.
- 1.30 P.M. One half of the Prisoners admitted on deck, those remaining below being arranged in Schools as in the forenoon.
- 3 P.M. Schools to break up.
- 4 P.M. Down all beds and Hammocks.
- 5 P.M. One man from each Mess admitted on Deck to wash Mess Utensils.
- 5.20 P.M. Prayers.
- 6 P.M. Petty Officers of the day and night mustered on Deck.
- 8 P.M. Down all Prisoners.
- 9 P.M. Rounds.

WEEKLY ROUTINE

- TUESDAY The same as Monday and all Prisoners to be shaved. Captains of Divisions to see this order carried out.
- WEDNESDAY The same as Monday and those Prisoners whose turn it is to be on Deck in the forenoon to wash their clothes, the man in each Mess delivering the same to the Captains of the Upper Deck.
- THURSDAY The same as Wednesday and remaining half of Prisoners to wash their clothes.
- FRIDAY The same as Monday.
- SATURDAY Schools suspended. Bottom Boards to be scrubbed and dried on Deck. All Prisoners to be shaved and to be employed in mending clothes &c.
- SUNDAY The same as Monday. Divine Service at 11 Prisoners professing the Roman Catholic Faith will have one of their members to read Prayers to them already appointed. It is expected that all will assemble together in a clean and orderly manner for the Worship of Almighty God.

On the 20th January 1862, was appointed Surgeon Superintendent of the Convict Ship Norwood.

4th February 1862.

In accordance with instructions from Comptroller of Victualling, reported myself at the Office of Directors of Convict Prisons.

6th February 1862.

Visited the Convict Ship Norwood, fitting and off Deptford Dockyard.

13th February 1862.

In company with the Resident Agent for Transports inspected the Vessel and pointed out some slight alterations to be made, and reported to the Captain Superintendent that I was satisfied with the arrangements made for the safe conveyance of Prisoners.

16th February 1862.

Vessel proceeded in tow of a Steamer to Gravesend and anchored off Tilbury Fort at 6 P.M.

17th February 1862.

Reported the Vessel ready for the reception of the Pensioner Guard.

27th February 1862.

Pensioner Guard with their wives and families this day embarked viz;

- 1 Sergt. Major.
- 1 Sergeant.
- 2 Corporals.
- 26 Privates.
- 21 Women.

Some children in a very weakly condition.

Same day Mr. Coopes, the Religious Instructor joined .

Surgeon Superintendent dined on board for the first time.

At 2 P.M. proceeded in tow of Steamer and at 4 P.M. anchored off Chapmans Light.

At 6 A.M. vessel weighed anchor and proceeded to the Little Nore in tow of a Steamer, and Anchored off Sheerness at 8 A.M.

Before proceeding on Shore to report the arrival of the vessel, had the Guard paraded on the Quarter Deck to hear the regulations read, explained the nature and importance of the duties on which they were about to be employed. Ships company engaged in cleaning up decks and preparing for the reception of Prisoners.

10 A.M. In company with F. Bristow, Master, proceeded on shore to report arrival and subsequently went from Sheerness to Chatham and reported to the Governor of the Prison that the C.S. Norwood was ready for the reception of Prisoners. Made arrangements for the Convicts embarkation on the following day at 2 P.M.

Reported proceedings to Sir Joshua Jibb, K.C.B. &c and Secretary of the Admiralty.

Remained at Chatham for the night.

The Guards, their wives and families victualled on Fresh Provisions.

All the Prisoners admitted on deck till 5 P.M. when they were mustered below, Cooks and Petty Officers remaining on Deck till 7.30 P.M., when all were mustered and Prayers read in the Prison.

6 P.M. Anchored off the Grindle Light Vessel.

A Brief History

2nd August 1847	Qualified as Assistant Surgeon, then aged 21 years.
6th January 1848 Naval	Appointed Assistant Surgeon, Royal Navy, and served on board various Vessels, including "Caledonia" and "Impregnable".
2nd December 1855	Promoted to rank of Surgeon.
25th September 1860 the	Appointed Surgeon Superintendent on board Vessel "PALMERSTON" for <u>transportation of Male Convicts to Western Australia.</u>
20th January 1862	Appointed Surgeon Superintendent on board Vessel "NORWOOD" for the <u>transportation of Male Convicts to Western Australia.</u>
7th May 1863 Service	By his own request, was granted temporary appointment in the Naval of the Emperor of China.
8th April 1865	Appointed Surgeon Superintendent on board Vessel "RACEHORSE" for the <u>transportation of Male Convicts to Western Australia.</u>
30th June 1868 in New	Recommended for promotion to the rank of Staff surgeon by His Royal Highness, the Duke of Edinburgh, after Dr. Watson had shown great ability attending to wounds suffered by the Duke, in an assassination attempt in South Wales.
4th July 1868	Promoted to rank of Staff Surgeon.
1868 - 1878	Surgeon on board various Naval Vessels. Promoted to the rank of Deputy Inspector General. His employment record contains a great number of Testimonials. eg: "He conducted himself with great zeal and attention and his work was beyond praise." Died: Date Unknown.

These Surgeon's Daily Journals record a most important part of West Australian History, and should not be overlooked by

researchers, particularly those who descend from a Convict, Pensioner Guard, or Warder, carried on one of these vessels.
