Introduction

Between the years of 1850 and 1868, almost Ten Thousand Convicts were transported to Western Australia, aboard Forty-three Vessels.

By order of the Home Government, the Surgeon Superintendent on board each vessel was required to keep an accurate account of all events that took place during the voyage.

This, the Journal of Alexander Watson M.D., R.N., Surgeon Superintendent, records events which took place each day on board the Convict Ship "Racehorse", which, with its most valuable cargo of 280 Male Convicts, made passage from England to Western Australia in the year of 1865.

When reading this transcript, it is important to note that:-

INDEX TO PERSONS MENTIONED IN THE TEXT

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. THE PRISONERS must conduct themselves in a respectful and becoming manner to all the Officers on Board and they are strictly to obey such orders as I may issue through the Warders on duty or Heads of Messes.
- 2. THE PRISONERS must behave themselves in a decent and becoming manner at all times but more especially when Prayers are read to them or Divine Service performed. Prayers morning and evening weather permitting.
- 3. CURSING and all foul language, quarreling, fighting, exchanging or giving away clothes are strictly prohibited.
- 4. ANY PERSON stealing or secreting any of the Mess Stores or any article belonging to the Mess or the Ship will be severely punished.
- 5. THE PRISONERS are on no occasion to hold conversation with the Guard or talk through the bars below.
- 6. EACH MESS shall have a Captain, and it will be the business of one man in his turn to clean the Mess Utensils, the latter after each meal are to be taken on Deck and thoroughly cleansed and dried before being taken below. The members of each Mess to sit together.
- 7. THE CAPTAINS OF MESSES are warned that they will be held responsible for the good order and cleanliness of their Messes, they are to see that the men wash themselves every morning and that they attend to their hair, that there are no stragglers at night and no one sleeping with their clothes on.
- 8. SMOKING TOBACCO or striking lights of any kind in the Prison, washing clothes or attempting to dry them below will not be allowed under any pretence.
- 9. THE CAPTAINS OF MESSES will receive their provisions in the order of their Messes, they are to tally the pieces of meat and deliver them to the Cooks, they are also to receive Water for their Messes.
- 10. THE BEDDING is to be taken on deck every morning when the weather will permit. WARDERS on duty to see the beds neatly rolled up by 5.30, after which they are to be handed through the Prison gate to the Upper Deck Crew to be stowed by them and when they are ordered down they are to be received by the same party.
- 11. IF AT ANY TIME a Prisoner has reason to complain of provoking language or treatment from the Ships Company or Guard he is strictly forbidden to retaliate, but to make the same known to me that the complaint may be investigated.
- 12. THE SURGEON SUPERINTENDENT has to impress upon the minds of the Prisoners that their future prosperity and happiness will depend on their good conduct on board and the report he shall have to make to the Governor of the Colony on arrival.

- 4.30 A.M. PRISONER COOKS, 3 in number, admitted on Deck, at 5.30 Upper Deck Crew admitted on deck for the purpose of filling washing tubs and Prisoners at the same time to commence taking up their beds and Hammocks.
- 6.00 A.M. Half the Prisoners admitted for the purpose of washing their persons under the superintendence of the Warder on duty, half an hour being allowed for this purpose.
- 7.30 A.M. Down all Prisoners. Ships Company to commence washing Upper Deck and Water Closets.
- 8.30 A.M. Breakfast. One man from each Mess admitted on Deck for the purpose of washing up their Mess utensils.
- 9.00 A.M. All the Prisoners admitted on Deck with the exception of two men in each Mess who in rotation will clean and scrape dry the Prison Deck and their berths, the bottom boards of the latter being removed, during which time I will attend in the Surgery and see Sick.
- 9.30 A.M. Prison inspected after which all the Prisoners will be assembled for Prayers.
- 10.00 A.M. One hal of the Prisoners sent on Deck for the purpose of exercise, the other half being arranged in Schools under the Superintendence of the Religious Instructor assisted by Monitors.
- 11.30 A.M. Schools to break up. One Warder and Inspector of Provisions to be presented at the Issuing of Lime Juice.

Noon. Dinner.

- 12.30 P.M. One man from each Mess to be admitted on Deck for the purpose of washing Mess utensils.
- 1.20 P.M. Deck to be swept up.
- 1.30 P.M. Half the Prisoners admitted on deck for exercise the other half remaining below to be arranged in Schools as in the forenoon.
- 4 P.M. Down all beds and Hammocks.

THURSDAY The same as Wednesday and remaining half of Prisoners to wash their clothes.

FRIDAY The same as Monday.

<u>SATURDAY</u> Schools suspended. Bottom Boards to be scrubbed and dried on Deck. Prisoners to be shaved and employed in mending.

SUNDAY

The same as Monday. Divine Service at 10 A.M, Prisoners professing the Roman Catholic Faith will have one of their number to read Prayers to them. It is expected that all will assemble together in a clean and orderly manner for the WORSHIP OF ALMIGHTY GOD.

THE WARDERS on duty are directed to report to me any infringement of these Rules and Regulations and Daily Routine, also any irregularities that they may occur in the Prison, and all orders issued by them are to be strictly attended to.

At noon joined the Convict Ship "Racehorse" anchored off Gravesend and the same day the Pensioner Guard with their wives and families were embarked from Tilbury Fort, one man with his wife and family being rejected as some members of the latter had recently been affected with measles. Permission granted for them joining the Vessel at Portland, provided no fresh case occurred.

The Pensioner Guard with their wives and families actually embarked comprised the following numbers, viz:- 49 Men.

There has been repeated complaints from Guard and Convicts relative to their respective galleys for cooking. The place appropriated for the Guard is quite inadequate for sea service.

Noon. 80 Convicts and 1 Warder with his wife and family were embarked for passage to W. Australia.

Received private property belonging to Convicts and signed all documents relative to same.

2 P.M. Deputy Governor and Warder from Portland Prison proceeded on Shore in H.M. Gunboat, tender to St. George.

During the day all Prisoners admitted on deck when circumstances would permit, their conduct quiet and orderly.

5 P.M. On visiting and prescribing for the sick, one of the Convicts named George Liversage, embarked from Portsmouth Prison, was found to be seriously ill. At the morning visit he first complained of cough, difficulty of breathing, with profuse mucus prevelant expectoration. He was ordered a draught and to remain quiet. This morning all the symptoms were aggravated and he was removed into Prisoners Hospital and suitable remedies prescribed, there was a great prostration of strength and from the profuse mucus prevelant expectoration as well as from other symptoms present, I concluded an abscess had built in left lung. He was ordered Port Wine every two hours with other appropriate remedies.

7 P.M. Patient feels easier but weak.

- 8. Evening Service and all Prisoners below.
- 9. Rounds, All quiet and orderly.

During the forenoon aquired from the Water boat of H.M.S. St.George, 15 tons Fresh Water.

Reported the Vessel ready for Sea to Director of Transport and Convict Service.

Received a Telegram from War Department to know if the daughter of Sergt Major Quinn could be secured of a passage to W. Australia. Replied in the affirmative.

Received intimation that Mr. Impey, one of the Pensioner Guard with his wife and family who had been rejected at Tilbury on account of measles existing amongst the latter had been directed to proceed to Portland to wait passage to W. Australia. Gave permission for their embarkation, the disease already existing on board the Vessel.

The Guard, their wives and families victualled on Fresh Provisions and 200 Convicts ditto.

Gave direction for the 80 Convicts this day embarked to receive one ration of chocolate.

Was last seen alive at 2 A.M. when he partook of some Wine & Water.

Daily routine of Prisoners proceeding as directed.

- 9.30 Communicated with the Governor of Portland Prison respecting the death of Convict George Liversage & requested that a coffin might be supplied from the Prison and an arrangement made for the interment of the deceased.
- 10.30 A.M. Guard paraded on the Poop. Gave directions for the Pensioners named in the margin, being temperance men, to have the allowance directed by the instructions in lieu of the ration of Spirits and taken up by them.

The Contractor at Weymouth not having supplied the first Meat and Vegetables demanded on the 16th Inst. for the 80 Convicts embarked yesterday, and no Vegetables having been received with fresh beef received yesterday, gave directions for the issue of 23 lbs Salt Meat Ration and 186 lbs Biscuit in lieu of Vegetables.

- 1.30 Received intimation from the Governor of Portland Prison that a coffin would be supplied from that establishment, and that a Coroners Inquest would be held on the following day at 11 A.M.
- 5 P.M. Coast Guard boat brought off coffin and the body of deceased was sent on shore in one of the Ships boats.

Reported proceedings to Director of Transport and Convict Services .

- 1 P.M. On returning Warder "Williams", in stepping into the boat slipped and fell on landing steps by which he sustained a dislocation of right shoulder. He was removed into an adjoining shed and the dislocation was at once reduced.
- 1.30 Returned on board the Vessel. Boat from H.M.S. St. George came alongside and Vessel completed with Water.

The daughter of Sergt. Major Quinn received for passage to W. Australia. Mathew Impey (Pensioner Guard) with his wife and four children embarked this day. This man had been rejected at Tilbury Fort on account of Measles prevailing in his family.

Prisoners all admitted on deck during the day, their conduct quiet and orderly.

Received instructions from the Director of Transports that Crew had not been completed in accordance with agreement and directing the same to be complied with immediately. Communicated my instructions to the Master of the Vessel.

The Guard, their wives and families victualled on Fresh Provisions. 279 Convicts on ditto.

Received 2 days Victualling for Guard and Convicts, viz:- 524 lbs Beef.

The Guard, their wives and families and 279 Convicts victualled on Fresh Provisions.
