The Hashemy Men

Part Two

In Part One (Ed note: last newsletter Oct 2010) we set the scene preparatory to providing a full list of the EPF members who arrived on the *Hashemy* (1).

Prior to the departure of the ship, a long report of July 11, 1850 outlined conditions of service on the vessel, duties to be done, payments, provisions, reporting lines, food, discipline, etc. Very usefully, the report ends by naming those soldiers who were serving only as Temporary Pensioners. Conditions of service for them were discussed in an earlier edition of the *EPG Gazette* (2).

One soldier recruited for the *Hashemy* voyage did not make it. J Matthews, formerly of the 11th Foot, was struck off the list because of sickness in his family: "you did quite right in not sending Matthews" responded the War Secretary's Department (3).

Surgeon Bowler of the Hashemy prepared copious sick list and health care reports during the voyage and maintained a brief and matter-of-fact journal. He also expansive 'general remarks' summarising the situation and sometimes commenting on ways of improving conditions. Many EPF men appear in his informative medical reports, along with family members and convicts. The subject matter of Bowler's writings is not always pleasant, but things had been much worse in a previous Hashemy voyage to New South Wales (4). In 1849 Surgeon Browning dealt with the horrors of an outbreak of cholera on the ship.

The Hashemy arrived in WA on October 24, 1850; Captain John Bruce reported the event to the Colonial Secretary one day later and provided a brief return of EPF men and their families. Sadly, all was not well. Bruce believed the senior NCO on the Hashemy, Sergeant Thomas Brown, to be 'deficient' and not up to the job, so he arranged for him to be

replaced on November 11 by the stalwart Sergeant John Kirwan (a former *Scindian* man) while the newly arrived contingent was in Fremantle (5).

Sergeant Brown had given meritorious service in two regiments for many years, but prolonged periods in the tropics and recent alcohol abuse had taken a toll. The sergeant recognised the problem and sent in a supporting letter himself, agreeing with Bruce's suggestion that he move into retirement from the EPF. However, Captain Bruce made sure the old soldier continued to receive a military pension and Brown maintained his links with the EPF for many years (6).

One obvious trend emerges from the listings below. About half the *Hashemy* pensioner guards later found employment with the Convict Establishment or the Police Force, or with both in turn. That comes as no surprise. As mentioned in Part One, the earlier EPF contingents of the 1850s in particular were good sources for recruits in difficult times.

In the lists that follow, the *Bicentennial Dictionary of Western Australian* is cited as *BD*. D.J.Barker, *Warders and Gaolers*, WA Genealogical Society (2000) is cited as Barker. F.H.Broomhall, *The Veterans*, Hesperian Press (1989) is cited as Broomhall.

James Hayden – 10th Foot, Broomhall B129 (Employed by the Convict Establishment 1851-1859, Barker, pp99-100. Not to be confused with his police officer son of the same name. BD Vol 2, D-J, p140)

John Kearney – 63rd Foot, Broomhall B153 (police constable 1853:WA Police Record of service. BD Vol 3, K-Q, p1687)

Patrick Lee – 47th Foot, Broomhall B166 (BD Vol 3, K-Q, p1821)

Roderick McKenzie – 41st Foot, Broomhall B194 (*BD Vol 3, K-Q, p2006*)

John McKernan – 99th Foot, Broomhall B195 (BD Vol 3, K-Q, p2008)

Matthew Mitchell – 63rd Foot, not in Broomhall

Arthur Mortimer – 2nd Royal Artillery, not in Broomhall (an overseer in the Convict Establishment in 1851, Barker, p156)

John Pratt – 24th Foot, Broomhall 228-229 (BD Vol 3, p2527. Wrongly identified, due to a newspaper spelling error, with a man who died in a riding accident in August 1866. The deceased man was actually police constable Francis Rowland Spratt)

James Quirk – 54th Foot, Broomhall B232 (police constable 1851-1852:WA Police Record of Service. BD Vol 3, K-Q, p2560)

George Ruddock – 2nd Foot Guards, Broomhall B247 (*BD Vol 4, R-Z, p2696*)

Richard Trayhorne – 96th Foot, Broomhall B280-281 (*Employed by the Convict Establishment 1851, Barker, p204. Then a police constable 1851-1852:WA Police record of Service. BD Vol 4, R-Z, p3096*)

William White – 99th Foot, Broomhall B295 (BD Vol 4, R-Z, p3290. He has been confused with William White of the 10th Regiment, who was not on the 'Hashemy'. White of the 10th Regiment arrived in WA on the 'Adelaide' in 1855.

The 'Hashemy' man is identifiable with the pensioner guard Corporal White who worked briefly for the Convict Establishment in early 1851. See Broomhall under B294, who mentions the 10th Regiment soldier, and Barker, p215. A sick list report of Surgeon Bowler of the 'Hashemy' helps clarify the issue — during the voyage he was described as Corporal William White. Elevation to sergeant for this former member of the 99th Regiment came after his arrival in WA)

Reminiscenses of Our Group But Food for Thought

When I read the article Pensioner Guard Village 1851-1874 in the October EPG Gazette, page 11, was faintly amused that back in 1999 when the article was written in good faith anyone would make the highly erroneous statement that British soldiers and sailors were retired on half pay when today any one with the slightest interest in the British Army would know that the term "On Half Pay" referred exclusively to officers of both the British Army & Royal Navy [but not the Royal Marines, the Royal Engineers, Royal Artillery, or the Honourable East India Company's Armies]. On further reflection it bought home to me that vigilance must be maintained in any article printed in our Gazette, or indeed in any publication, and the need to reference primary material is paramount. We saw the fall out of this lack of surveillance when the entry for the Historical Encyclopedia was written.

I went back to May 2000 Volume 1, No 1 edition of the EPG Gazette to refresh my memory of the original aims of the Enrolled Pensioner Guard Special Interest Group as they may have become clouded by time.

- To conduct meetings for members of the Western Australian Genealogical Society Inc. who have a special interest in members of the Enrolled Pensioner Force/Guard.
- To develop a Register.
- To encourage and enable those with common research interests to share information.
- To build a resource file as an aid for members' research.
- To provide opportunities for persons with the same research interests to share their research.
- To find speakers relevant to our research.
- To provide opportunities for social interaction.

- To add to the information in Broomhall's book and create a file of guards' profiles for perpetuity.
- To provide a quarterly newsletter which addresses members' interests.

We have fulfilled all of these aims to a high degree and we are now embarking on an ambitious project to enlarge on and adding to the information in 'The Veterans' with the Ship/Guard project announced on page 2 of the October issue of the EPG Gazette and in this issue.

Ship Project

As you'll all be aware from the Editor's article in this Newsletter, we are underway with the Enrolled Pensioner Guard Ship's Project. The Special Interest Group has decided that information now available on the Enrolled Pensioner's released since the last publications by Frank Broomhall and Rica Erickson needs to be used as a basis to and include update extra information available and published to add to the information about this special group of men. The form this publication will take will be decided on by the committee when we get further along with the project.

As advised by the Editor each ship will have a team researching all the guards to arrive on a particular ship. The person overseeing the ship will be known as the "Captain" of the Ship. This person will collate the information gathered and offer guidelines to other members of the group.

As "Captain" of the Hougoumont I have commenced stage 1 of the project which entails gathering information about the Guard himself. This information will be gathered mainly from their discharge documents (WO97) for army men. This will include date/place of birth, date of enlistment/discharge, Regiment, areas where Guard served, where gone to pension, grant of medals and other information as we progress (we have a checklist to guide you).

Stage 2 will include the gathering of information about parent, wife and children.

Stage 3 will be decided upon at a later date.

Each ship will work at its own speed and when enough information is gathered will be passed to the "Admiral of the Fleet" who will work with the committee and the Western Australian Genealogy Society to decide the form of publication. The Admiral will also keep details of who is researching the individual ships. (I have also been asked to act as AOF)

The subject will be one of the items discussed at the next meeting Saturday 26th February 2011, so we ask all members to think about taking on either the roll of Captain or conducting some of the research required.

Please remember this is a collaborative long term project

Sites for searching Birth, Marriage & Death Records By Jeanette Lee

It is hardly surprising that many of our Enrolled Pensioner Guards are recorded on their WO 97s as being born in the various counties of Ireland when we consider that in 1830 the British Army comprised of 42.2 per cent Irish born soldiers. The ratio had fallen to 27.9 per cent in 1870 and 15.6 in 1880.1 We must also keep in mind that this was for all Ireland well before the creation of the Irish Free State.

For many years we were fobbed off with the excuse that Irish BMDs were no longer in existence having been one of the casualties of the 1922 Civil War when they were used for barricades in the Dublin Four Courts uprising, when in actual fact many churches were so suspicious of bureaucracy they had never sent the records to the Public Record Office in the first place. Fortunately for us an increasing amount of sites are now appearing online, of course most of them are at a cost but it is minimal when compared to hiring a researcher or contemplating a visit to Dublin.

Registration for Church of Ireland Marriage records started in 1845 and 1864 for Births and Death records; for the Catholic Church registration started in 1864 for all Births, Marriages and Deaths. Prior to this they were recorded by the Parish Priest or Minister.

Familysearch has long been a source of BMDs for many areas but it was not until it established its Pilot & Beta websites that it has covered Ireland in any depth. As both sites are evolving it takes patience but both sites look promising.

The Irish Family History Foundation site is found at:

www.rootsireland.ie

It covers most of Ireland with the exception of the counties of Carlow, Clare, Cork (South), Kerry, Monaghan, Waterford, Wexford and a part of Dublin but all of these will be covered in time. It is free to search but you do need to register and log on, it costs 5 euros for a record which when considering the cost of a certificate from our own Register Office is quite reasonable also much quicker being generated online.

All is not lost for those with interests in Kerry and Carlow as the Search Church Records site at: www.irishgenealogy.ie covers both County Carlow and Kerry for both the Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland dioceses, it has also parts of Dublin City for both and the Catholic records for Cork & Ross. There are some Presbyterian records for Lucan, County Fingal. This site has great promise as it is a work in progress and as an added bonus the records are free.

Another place that I have had results is the GRO Regimental Indices and Chaplains Returns that are now available on many sites such as Findmypast and Ancestry but you still have to order these online through the GRO.

I am sure there are many more sites online for BMD records and if anyone has a favourite perhaps they could share it with us but if all this fails there is always a visit to contemplate.

Sergeant James Graham

James Graham, the son of a farmer named Andrew Graham and his wife Agnes, was born in the north of Ireland in early 1829, at Drumgarth near Rathfriland in County Down. The Grahams were an Ulster Scottish family. staunch Congregational Church defenders of the protestant ascendency (1). Young James worked as a weaver before choosing a more adventurous calling. He enlisted in the 7th Regiment of Foot of the British Army at Newry, County Armagh, on December 30, 1846. His regimental number was 2191 (2).

The 7th was an old regiment, raised by Lord Dartmouth in 1685. Called the 'Ordnance Regiment' at first, it received a number in the Royal Warrant of 1751 and was called either the 7th or 'Ye Royal Fusiliers'or both. The Royal Fusiliers triumphed numbers were abolished as a consequence of the army reforms of 1881. The 7th compiled a mightily impressive record of service in several wars, not least in the Crimea during the conflict of 1854-1856, where it acquired the additional battle honours of Alma. Inkerman and Sebastopol (3)

Young soldier Graham was on the thick of it from the time he landed in the Crimea on September 14, 1854. He had already been promoted to corporal and experienced war at its most deadly at the Alma, during which battle the 7th shot to pieces the Russian Kazan Regiment in a prolonged slogging match fought at 50-yards range. Later he did well enough to gain sergeant's rank in June 1855. In the brave attempt to storm the Redan at Sebastopol on September 8, 1855 the regiment performed further wonders, but to no avail. Sergeant James Graham was very badly wounded - shot in the face in such a way that the missile penetrated both cheeks (4).

James returned to England in November 1855, spent time at Chelsea Hospital and

was then discharged because of his wounds in February 1856. He was made a military pensioner and returned to his home town, Rathfriland, until the opportunity came to join the Enrolled Pensioner Force in 1862. He arrived in Western Australia on the 'Norwood' in June of that year. As Broomhall reveals, he had acquired a good conduct badge and received fine character references from a clergyman and an army staff officer.

Within a few years of arrival James Graham began to look for public employment opportunities outside the ranks of the EPF. The colonial Police Force was an obvious choice, partly because of strong reform measures in progress under Superintendent William Hogan. A former soldier himself, Hogan had a 'low tolerance' approach towards breaches of discipline and lapses from acceptable police standards of conduct. After taking charge in 1861 he removed or demoted quite a few sergeants constables over the following five years (5).

Superintendent Hogan needed replacements and he recruited some through an informal probationary system, as shown in the following letter to the Governor dated January "[1865: have the honour recommend...the following men be appointed constables (on trial for two months) - Adam Bently, Michael Clark, John McKay, Spencer Hayman, Joseph Campbell and James Graham". Crimean veteran James Graham was not the only soldier listed - John McKay is also identifiable as an EPF man, a former corporal in the 96th Regiment of Foot who arrived in the colony during 1863 (6).

Officer Graham was stationed at Guildford and completed his trial period successfully in March. The end of his brief law enforcement career came quickly. A month later Graham had a confrontation with a violent drunkard, arrested him and used his 'staff' (truncheon) to flatten the man in the process. That was a

direct breach of a Circular Order issued by Hogan in 1861, which emphasised the need for restraint and care in using force.

Hogan felt obliged to take action, though the business made him unhappy, and he wrote thus to the Governor on April 29, 1865: "I have the honour to recommend that Constable Graham of Guildford be allowed to resign his situation for using a greater degree of violence with his staff in the arrest than I think was absolutely necessary"(7).

James Graham had been treated kindly, under the circumstances, and probably his experience. learned from importantly he had not been disgraced and other doors remained open. In December 1866 he became an Assistant Warder in the Convict Establishment and during the next few years served in various locations, sometimes supervising working parties well away from Perth or Fremantle. His record was quite a good one in comparison to many, although Barker's book on Establishment personnel does list a few offences which cost James money by way of various fines. He obtained a permanent transfer to Fremantle Prison in March 1875.

There were signs all was not well: Graham's war wounds were starting to give him major problems. In the 1870s we read of facial infections and swelling on three occasions and just once there is a hint he had taken to the drink. All the same, officialdom held this veteran in some regard and accorded him due respect - he was chosen for temporary duty in the Governor's office in March 1879, probably as an orderly. As a staunch Ulsterman, Graham also became a member of the Loyal Orange Order. In 1883 he received a land grant of one acre in North Fremantle.

James Graham reached the position of Warder before medical issues - most likely involving chronic pain and discomfort compelled him to retire on September 1,1889. He died at Jarrahdale in August 1894 and was buried in Fremantle cemetery (8)

OBITUARY.

MR. H. BLINCO.

An old Western Australian pioneer passed away in the person of Harry Blinco, last week, at Swansbournestreet, Fremantle, at the age of 75. The deceased, who had served in Her Majesty's Blith Regiment, arrived here with his wife in the ship Merchantman, in 1864. It was his intention to join his brother in Queensland, and take up farming, but owing to the poor passenger service in those days between the colonies, he decided to remain in Western America. For a number of years he was engaged as one of the principal officers in the gool, and retired on a ern Australia. For a number of years he was engaged as one of the principal officers in the gaol, and retired on a pension in 1898. During the time he was in the army he formed part of a contingent sent to North India to take part in a threatening engagement, but after marching 1,400 miles, the trouble was found to have been settled. The late Mr. Blinco was twice married, his first wife predeceasing him some 33 years ago. He leaves five sons and one daughter, besides several grandsons and his widow to mourn their loss. The funeral took place on Friday, Dec. 6, at the Fremantic Cemetery, the remains being interred in the Church of England portion. The chief mourners were Mrs. Blinco (widow), Messrs. Thomas, Edward, and John Blinco (sons). Miss Blinco (daughter), and Messrs. Thomas, Frank, and Ivan Blinco (grandchildren). The pall-bearers were Messrs. W. Dawson, J. Hoasick, W. Boyle, and Howson. Numerous wreaths and floral tributes were sent. The Rev. F. G. O'Halloran conducted the service at the graveside, after which, in a short address, he said that Mr. Blinco belonged to that sturdy band of pioneers who had made Australia what it was to-day. He was a man who had a stern sense of the responsibilities of life. He was unlike many of the younger generation in that his mind was sleavy fixed on the realimany of the counger generation in that his mind was always fixed on the realities and difficulties of life rather than its pleasures and amusements.

Butler's Swamp



EARLY MILITARY HISTORY.

Address by Colonel Collett.

Addressing the Press sub-branch of the Returned Soldiers' League yesterday, the president of the League (Col. Collett) gave some interesting facts about the early military affairs of Western Australia. He said: - "The first regular troops to appear in Western Australia landed at King George's Sound on Christmas Day, 1826, and formed part of an expedition, despatched from Sydney, to found а settlement. The detachment belonged to the 39th Foot (now the 1st Battalion of the Dorset Regiment) and was commanded by Major Lockyer, of the 57th Regiment (now the 1st Battalion of the Middlesex Regiment). Major Lockver's descendants included Sir Nicholas Lockyer, who did such good work for soldiers during and after the war. During 1828 a further expedition to form a settlement at the Swan organised River was by the British Government. A request was made to the War Office to furnish troops not exceeding 100 in number. This was agreed to and the details were announced as follow: — A captain lieutenant, 2 ensigns, an assistant surgeon, sergeants, 3 corporals, a bugler, 56 privates and 32 women and children. These were drawn from the No. 2 or Light Company of the 63rd Regiment of Foot — afterwards called the West Suffolk Regiment and now known as the 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment. The numbers that actually embarked revealed a shortage of two privates and an excess of one woman or child. The War Office also notified that the officers had no families with the exception of the assistant surgeon, who would require accommodation for five ladies. The doctor was drowned in Table Bay during the voyage. The troops embarked on H.M.S. Sulphur, which arrived in Cockburn Sound on June 8. 1829. They disembarked on June 17 and remained in the colony for four years. Of the officers it is interesting to note that 18 years later Captain Irwin became Governor of the colony: The Irwin River and Irwin Street, are named after him. The life of the troops in the new country may be easily imagined. While a large proportion of them were in, the

possession of a knowledge of some trade, they were mostly employed on public works fatigues, and there is something familiar in the, civil engineer's complaint to the Governor that he could not get satisfactory work out of them. His Excellency, was pleased to direct the O.C. Troops to take immediate action by detailing a non-commissioned officer to superintend each fatigue.

'Soldiers' Rations.'

In the way of rations I have been able to gather that they were allowed, daily, 1 1/2lb. of bread or 1 lb of biscuit. 1lb of fresh meat, and, one pint of wine or a third of a pint of spirits. But on arrival here Captain Irwin recommended an addition of cocoa or coffee. rice, curry stuff — in all sufficient to give a breakfast and supper. Women were allowed half rations and children under twelve quarter rations - except that extra bread was to be issued in lieu of wine or spirits. From evidences I am a little dubious about the fresh meat: because, later, Captain Irwin asked that the Assistant Surgeon be given authority, on account of an out-break of scurvy, to issue, or authorise to be issued, fresh or preserved meat to those who he thought needed it. There was also complaint in regard to the difficulty in securing green vegetables, and I cannot conceive that the wine and spirit issue stood the strain for long. The pay of the troops was as follows: — The captain, 11/7 a day, less certain minor stoppages for provisions supplied; lieutenant 6/6; an ensign, 5/3: a sergeant, I/10; a corporal, 11d.; a bugler; 7 3/4d: a private, after 14 years' service, 8d. from 7 to 14 years service, 7d., under 7 years service, In 1833 the (company of the 63rd Regiment was relieved by two companies of the 21st (Royal Scots Fusiliers), which, in turn, were replaced in 1840 by a similar force of the 51st Regiment (King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry). Later reliefs consisted of one company only, and were supplied firstly by the 99th Regilment (Duke of Edinburgh's Lankashire Regiment, disbanded during the, penultimate decade of the 19th century), and secondly and lastly by the 12th Regiment (Suffolk Regiment). Royal Engineer officers and detachments of the Royal. Sappers and Miners arrived at various dates, the total of the latter corps at one time exceeding 100 rank and file. These artificers were pally engaged in directing and superintending the work of the convict gangs on the public works of the colony. The whole of the regular troops while stationed in Western Australia formed portion of the garrison of the Australian colonies, the headquarters being at various times situated in Sydney, Melbourne, and New Zealand.

Military Pensioners.

The last of the Queen's troops left Fremantle for Hobart on March 8, 1863. But Western Australia was not left defenceless. As a part of its emigration policy the Home Government in 1850 commenced to send out parties of military pensioners. Those were of the type of, which we are strong advocates at the present day. These pensioners, who brought their wives and families with them, made the voyage on convict ships, of which they formed the guards. On arrival they either took up land or entered into the service of the settlers. This policy was continued for many years and by 1864 something over 2,000 persons had thus been added to the population. Representations made by the Governor as to the weak state of the garrison of the colony; elicited a reply (1854) from the Duke of Newcastle that in view of the disturbed state of politics in. Europe, the Government was not prepared to increase number of troops, but suggesting that advantage should be taken of the influx of military pensioners to enrol them as an auxiliary force to the regulars. Action was accordingly taken, and Captain John Bruce, who had arrived in the colony with the first detachment, was appointed staff-officer to the enrolled pensioner force. This unit, which at one time showed a strength of over 600, assisted the line companies in the various garrison; duties, and finally .assumed all responsibilities. At one time about 300 rank and file were thus continuously employed. Captain Finnerty succeeded Captain Bruce. In November, 1880; the Enrolled Pensioner Force was abolished and a new unit, the Enrolled Guard was formed from amongst its members. March 31, 1887, witnessed the last parade of this body of old soldiers. To

accommodate the troops small guard houses were built wherever detachments were permanently stationed. Barracks were erected in Perth in 1832 and were situated between the present Town Hall and the Treasury buildings. Hence the name of that street. Barracks for the Enrolled Pensioner Force were commenced in South-terrace. Fremantle, in 1852, and still stand. In 1863 the building which marks the western end of St. George's terrace. Perth, was begun. It was designed to accommodate the increased pensioner force necessitated bν the withdrawal of the regular troops. It contained 120 rooms, hospital, magazine, and other annexes. A rifle range was opened on Mt. Eliza in 1863. The remains of the stop-butt are still there, and the 1,000 yards firing point was somewhere near where the Observatory now stands. I fired my recruits course over it. It was closed about the end of 1895.

The Volunteer Movement.

But the Enrolled Pensioner Force in its task of defending the colony was not without supports. The volunteer movement revived in Great Britain in 1859, spread to these shores and was taken up by the in habitants with considerable energy. Naturally Perth was the centre of activity, and it is in connection with the formation of our premier regiment and its period of adolescence that I want to relate one or two interesting facts. The proceedings of a meeting held in Strickland's Hotel (now the United Service) September 11, 1861, the Hon. Lieut.-Colonel Bruce presiding, gave birth to the following resolutions: — Proposed by T. N. Yule, and seconded by F. Griskin: — 'That it is desirable that a volunteer rifle corps should be formed in Perth, to be styled the Metropolitan Volunteer Rifles.' — Carried unanimously. Proposed by C. King, and seconded by A. O'G. Lefroy: — 'That a deputation, consisting of the chairman, Messrs. Dyett, G. Shenton. W. J. Clifton, J. G. C? Carr, be requested to wait upon his Excellency to solicit his approval and cooperation. — Carried unanimously. Proposed bν Mr. Carr, and seconded bγ Farmaner:? 'That this meeting adjourned until Friday, the 13th instant, at the same place and hour, when the committee will report his Excellency's decision '

Carried unanimously. Proposed by the Attorney-General, and second- ed by A. Shenton: — 'That the thanks of this meeting be given to R. Sholl, for his exertions in settling up this movement.' — Carried unanimously. Proposed by Mr. Lefroy and seconded by Mr W. J. Clifton -: - 'That Mr. Mark Dyett be appointed honorary secretary to the corps.' — Carried unanimously. Proposed by Mr. Dyett and seconded by Mr. Ba? — 'That the thanks of this meeting be given to Colonel Bruce, for the kind and willing manner in which he has come forward to promote the object of the meeting and for his able conduct in the chair. — Carried unanimously. After the above resolutions were passed, it was announced that the names of persons willing to join the proposed corps should be received, and in short time sixty-four names were put down. meeting having given three cheers for the Colonel, and one for the volunteer movement, adjourned. Within a few days the Governor gave his sanction to the formation of the corps, which, seven days later, had increased its strength to 94. Colonel Bruce acted as chief instructor, Lieutenant Thorold, R.E., performed the duties of adjutant; and N.C.O.'s of the 12th Regiment were the drill instructors. For a while drills commenced at 5.30 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily and no fault could be found with an, average attendance of 80. The 'Perth Gazette' of October 11, 1861, says: — We have little, local intelligence this week other than as relating to the Volunteers and the display of yesterday. Drill has lately taken, the place of our usual avocations but such a success as the field day, on Wednesday will make up to the public for shortcomings in either journalising or other business. Regulations were approved and these provided for the election of officers and N.C.O.'s by a general meeting of the company. The first officers were Captain L. S. Leake, Lieutenants M. Dyett and W. J Clifton, and Ensign J.B. Roe. All went well, until 1872. Captain Leake appears to have been popular and also to have possessed political, ambitions. It is suggested that, by these means he came into conflict with the Governor and his Executive. In any event, when he was informed that no money for volunteers would be provided in forthcoming estimates, he promptly resigned

his commission. Ensign Roe was offered he command, but he declined it, and Captain Burke, an Imperial officer, was appointed control. to When these proceedings came to the ears of the volunteers a general meeting was convened and much indignation was expressed at the action of the Governor in withholding funds and in foisting Captain Burke upon them without first consulting their wishes. Private Loftie? took the floor and enlarged upon the law and constitutional methods that; his Excellency appeared to be ignorant of. He was eloquently supported by Sergeant Hillman, who wound up his oration by moving, amidst immense cheering, that the corps be disbanded. This was carried and disbanded it was by a decision of the Executive Council hurriedly called together for that purpose. A few months later the unit was reformed by a forgiving Governor, but none of the former officers was reappointed and some trouble was experienced by Mr, Hillman in securing the acceptance of his offer to again serve in the ranks. Eventually; this gentleman, as a major, commanded the Metropolitan Rifle Volunteers and two of his sons served with distinction in the recent war.

With this short account of rather dubious incident in the history of the famous 11th Battalion; I conclude my talk with you to-day. Colonel Collett, on the motion of the president of the sub-branch, was accorded a hearty vote of thanks.



Ship Project

This project is slowly gathering momentum and we now have nine Captains covering eleven ships of the thirty-five arrivals.

Each "Gazette" will have a report indicating the type of research that has been carried out since the last report. This will enable those acting as Captain's of ships to have some idea of where I have been looking for information and will give other members of the group some idea where they may find information about "their Man".

Since the last report I have spent a great deal of time on the website www.findmypast.com looking for discharge documents (WO97) for both British Army and Royal Artillery. British Army Regiments appear straight forward as long as the documents have been filed under the correct name (if you find any errors please notify findmypast.com and hopefully they will correct the information).

Royal Artillery is sometimes a little more difficult as they seem to have Battalions and Battery's of their own.

Royal Marines have their own system of records and at present can be accessed www.nationalarchives.gov.uk through website.

Those men who served in the East India Company Armies have their records again in a different location. Some of the EIC information can be obtained through the website www.new.fibis.org.

Any serviceman who served in India may have some information on the FIBIS website. Some databases on this website are open to the general public, however, you do need to be a member to access all databases. I'm currently looking at the full membership to ascertain if it is worth having a membership.

Because a lot of the research being carried out at present refers to the service of EPG I'm currently trying to teach myself about the Military British system. this includes

information about the Regiment, medals that may have been granted for war service and information that may assist in researching these records.


Another avenue of research now being carried out is at the State Records of Western Australia. Visits to their office and accessing their AEON catalogue online at their website www.sro.wa.gov.au has proved worthwhile for some individuals being researched.

Georgia, thank you for making contact with the group, your research will be viewed with much interest.

From Sue White (wags member 449), on Thomas Bandy, ship Hashemy, 24-10-1850, 98th Regiment of Foot. Thank you for the profile on Thomas Bandy, this will become part of our EPG records. It will also assist our convenor and ship captain for the Hashemy. From Debbie Stirk(member 11616), thank you for information on John Gallagher an EPG who arrived on the Dudbrook in 1853, also vour thanks on articles in the magazine. I will pass on to the coordinator your submission, where it too will be part of our ongoing project.

Item of Interest for our members

forwarded to Jeanette Lee from Robyn Hukin WAGS member

The Friends of the National Archives have completed the cataloguing of more than 20,000 soldiers' records held Kilmainham Hospital in Dublin from 1783-1822. The files can now be found in The National Archives Catalogue and could provide the key for many people trying to discover their family history.

Kilmainham Hospital administered some pensions until 1822, when Chelsea Hospital took on the administration of out-pensioners from both establishments. The task of pensioners' cataloguing the discharge documents (certificates of service) in series WO 119 took a team of 14 volunteers just over three years. These records are now in process beina diaitised of findmypast.co.uk, in association with The National Archives and in partnership with FamilySearch. The equivalent records from Chelsea Hospital (series WO 97) have already been digitised by findmypast.co.uk and have been catalogued, up to 1854, by the Friends.



1st Royal Dragoons

John Kenny

Of the 19th Regiment

This soldier was born in about 1815 and served as a private in the 19th Regiment of Foot. Sorting out his various career moves in WA has at time been problematic. There are some indications of confusion between his life details and those of two other soldiers of the same name - both active in the colony from the 1850s onwards - which this piece will hopefully clarify.

One of the other men was an older John Kenny (1808-1883), a former sergeant in the 63rd Regiment of Foot who is described as a military pensioner but had no known direct connection with the Enrolled Pensioner Force. He joined the Police Force of the day and worked as a foot constable in Perth from 1853 to 1864 (1). The other was John Kenny (1821-1874) of the Royal Sappers and Miners, who worked for many years as a warder in the Convict Establishment (2).

John Kenny of the 19th arrived in the colony as a member of the EPF in 1850 or 1851. He may have been born in Ireland; his wife's name was Margaret Corbett. Kenny was on duty in Fremantle when he attracted the attention of Superintendent George Clifton, the first officer-in-charge of the Imperial Water Police. Clifton needed 'steady and able' recruits for the Water Police and Kenny the Enrolled Pensioner made the grade according to his assessment: 'accustomed to boating and bears the very highest character' (3).

John Kenny only served in the Water Police from January 9 until May 19, 1851. He then moved sideways to work as a night warder in the Convict Establishment. He became a gatekeeper on May 20, 1851 and continued in the position until resigning on February 2, 1852 (4).

He had conducted himself well and seems to have remained on the EPF strength in Fremantle for several years. Kenny was among the members sent north to settle at Greenough Flats in April 1858. He died at Greenough on August, 17 1864 and his John received the former soldier's land allotment of 33 acres in his place when grants were made in 1868 (5).

John Kenny the Younger (1852-1875), the first son of John the soldier and his wife Margaret Corbett, became a school teacher at Greenough, but died at a young age, as did several other male members of this particular Kenny family. The second son, Henry Edward Kenny, became a highly successful colonist, although one early career move proved to be a regrettable false start. Henry was born in Fremantle in March, 1853 and joined the Police Force as a probationary constable in March, 1874. He remained one for a full year before finally being sworn in as a fully fledged constable in Perth in March, 1875. This delay may be an indication of disciplinary problems, which ended in his dismissal from the police on June 18, 1875

Henry Kenny fell on his feet and moved north closer to Greenough – he worked as a warder at Geraldton Gaol from 1875 until 1877, then for the firm of Gale and Son. Additional reports show that he worked as a store assistant and draper and later as a stock and station agent.

He became a man of influence in the community and was an early joint proprietor of the 'Geraldton Express' newspaper. Henry Kenny finally entered politics and served as the Member of the Legislative Assembly for North Murchison from May 1897 until his death on August 25, 1899. Henry's son by his wife Albinia Tregoning died young, at the age of nine (7).

Vale Brenda Bell (15 Sep 1913 – 4 March 2011)



Brenda Bell, nee Minorgan, was born in Cottesloe on 15 September 1913 as second child and only daughter of Robert and Wilhelmina Minorgan.

Brenda had very fond memories of her childhood and of being the only girl among four brothers. Brenda's father passed away when she was only 13, her mother was left to struggle for her five young children alone.

Brenda left school aged 14 to attend business college. She soon entered the work force and much of her income of 17 shilling and 6d went toward supporting the family. With the Second World War upon Australia, Brenda joined the Women's Auxiliary Australia Air Force in Perth as one of the first women. Towards the end of the war. Brenda met career air force officer Flight Lieutenant John Bell whom she married in 1951.

John and Brenda had many postings and finally settled in Canberra. When John retired in 1970, Brenda felt it was time for them to return to Perth. In 1974 John finally gave in to his wife and moved with her back to WA. They settled in Roleystone at 12 Robin Road. Their neighbour met John and Brenda when they moved in next door to them in 1997.

John had earlier suffered a stroke and was almost confined to a wheelchair. But Brenda was ever so active looking after Saxon, their Clumber Spaniel, maintaining their beautiful garden and looking after the local birds and her fish. She used to say "One is nearer God's heart in a garden than anywhere else on earth". When John passed away in 2001, she was devastated, but would still keep her head up. Her saying was "Never give up and never give in". And what ever trouble life threw at her, this was her motive.

Family was everything to her and she was a true Australian, proud of her country, raising the Australian flag every morning and taking it down around four in the afternoon. I learnt from her that "you do not allow the sun to set on your flag".

In Brenda her neighbour felt she met the most remarkable woman ever and was an absolute inspiration to her. She admired her immensely and she was the best neighbour anybody can wish for.

Her family can take comfort in knowing that Brenda had a wonderful, fulfilled and long life. Vale forwarded courtesy of her son-law Jeffrey Oates. Written for a local newspaper by her neighbour.

Perth Pensioner Guard Barracks Gates now in Fremantle

For many years the iron gates at Fremantle Arts Centre guarded the entrance to the Pensioner Barracks complex in St. Georges Terrace, Perth. When the Barracks were demolished in 1966 they were put into storage until the Fremantle Museum and Arts Centre was opened in the 1970's and they were installed in the gateway fronting Finnerty Street. A plaque regarding their provenance was erected on the inside of the encircling limestone wall on the right side of the gates.

Some years ago while visiting the centre Jean McDonald and I photographed the plague, it is the only acknowledgement in Fremantle of the contribution the Pensioners made to the state.

Last year when visiting the centre Jean and I were distressed to find the plaque was nowhere to be seen and on inquiring at the office no one seemed to have any idea of what we were talking about let alone where it was. Never one to be beaten, Jean contacted Pete Stone the General Manger of the Fremantle Arts Centre who recognised the significance of the plaque and promised to look into its disappearance. True to his word, although Pete was not able to find the original plaque that had been removed during renovation he had a replica made and reinstalled.

When he notified us that it was back in place Jean and I visited it again and took new photos.

Our thanks go to Pete Stone, General Manager, Fremantle Arts Centre. City of Fremantle, for his interest and involvement in the replacement of the original lost sign.

Butlers Swamp, Claremont



Claremont Museum formerly the school house

As we are unable to progress any further with this project until the Claremont Council contacts us. Beth Smith and I decided to take a look at the area in Victoria Avenue (formerly Pensioners Terrace) and try to work out the exact location of the half acre grants.

We stopped off at the Claremont Museum and were lucky enough to find Lindy Wallace, the Museum Officer available. She showed us the files they have on some of the Pensioner Guards, mainly Thomas McMullen, John Atkinson, Samuel Sutton and Samuel Efford together with several photos of men in uniforms which we thought may be of volunteers as they seemed more ornamental than Enrolled Force uniforms. There were also photographs of the pensioners (not in uniform) and their families that have been donated the descendants of the by pensioners.

The Claremont Museum building purpose built in 1862 to house the school that had formerly been conducted in the living area of Mrs Herbert's cottage at P 245 as this cottage was slightly bigger than the other pensioner cottages and Mrs Herbert was the school mistress. After it was no longer used as a school house it was used for a variety of purposes including a police station and a boarding house.

Lindy advised us the location where Henry Herbert's cottage was is now, and has been for many years, the site of "The Mansions", a series of units painted a bright pink.

We walked along Victoria Avenue but, as we had not reckoned on the fact that there were 20 half acre blocks each with a frontage of 110 feet (33.53 metres) or as stated on the title deeds 1chain 67 links, we decided to take the car. Eventually we came to them and the photo shows a glimpse of Freshwater Bay at the rear of the property, a really stunning location.

It is quite astounding to realise that the 20 blocks covered 10 acres of river foreshore and to add to that the 20 lots of 9 ½ acres plus another 18 of around 10 acres each making a total of around 370 acres or 149.733 hectares Butlers at enclosing the area from Alfred, Davies and Shenton Roads, Servitus and Mitford Streets.

Needless to say Beth and I drove around the perimeter, there are many old houses still there but whether or not part of them was a pensioner cottage we were unable to say, it would take a very detailed examination to establish the veracity of such a claim.

Pensioner Guards on the **Convict Transport** Mermaid 1851

The twenty nine Pensioners of the guard for convict transport Mermaid embarked at Woolwich on the 20th December 1850 as were 51 of the convicts. The wives and children of the guards were embarked at Gravesend on the 21st December. The ship proceeded to Spithead (Portsmouth) on Christmas Day where two children showed signs of having measles and on 26th December the ship proceeded to Cowes (Isle of Wight).

On 27th December two children were sent to Haslar Naval Hospital (near Gosport). The remainder of the convicts (159) were embarked on 28th December. On 6th & 7th January 1851 another five children were sent to hospital, in all seven children and their parents were sent ashore. It was decided that no further sick children were to be sent ashore and after receiving replacements for the guards sent ashore the ship sailed on January 9th, however, due to inclement weather it had to put into Torbay (Torquay) on the 12th until the 18th when it sailed again only to have to put into Falmouth on the 19th December again due to the weather. Finally the Mermaid sailed for the Swan River on 1st February arriving on the 21st May 1851.

Of the 29 Pensioners comprising the guard 19 were Irish, 7 English and 3 were Scots.

SHIP'S DLARY.

To keep members up to date with the progress of the Ship's Project now underway. There are currently 10 members researching 12 ships. We are always looking for additional members to connect with their research into other ships.

The following are some of the ships currently without Captain's *Phoebe Dunbar, Sea Park, Ramillies, Stag, Adelaide,* and *William Hammond.* If your enrolled pensioner guard arrived on one of these then you might like to ensure further research is conducted and printed for future researchers. Help will be given to new Captain's to get them started.

Currently research is being carried out on the following ships. Scindian, Hasemy, Mermaid, Robert Small, Edwin Fox, York, Merchantman (1), Clyde, Clara (2), Racehorse, Vimiera and Hougoumont.

A meeting of Captain's was held Saturday 3rd September 2011 in which ideas and information was exchanged between the six of the Captain's presently in Western Australia. Everyone present including me gained a lot from this meeting. Looking at the research these members have already completed I am sure great results will be available for publication in the near future. Captains will continue to meet several times a year to exchange information.

Prior to each general meeting of the EPG Special Interest Group I will be available one hour before to meet with Captains or members of the group about the Project.

What *Hougoumont* research have I been conducting since our last newsletter? I'm still currently looking at information the State Record Office of Western Australia holds. This includes land grant documents, probate information and any other information that

results from searching their catalogue AEON. I'm still endeavoring to teach myself about the British military system for the period that our "men" served. WO 97 (discharge documents) for about five are proving elusive, but I'll continue to search www.findmypast.co.uk every few months in the hope that they suddenly appear. While this may sound very strange I have over the past six months found documents misfiled and have emailed findmypast who have corrected the filing.

Currently I'm searching the FIBIS website for information on any man who served in India either in the British Army or HEIC. As a member I'm now able to search additional databases. As the Captain I have searched the WABI files held in Unit 4 at the Library to see what was available on the *Hougoumont* arrivals. Please remember this resource for while there was nothing on the *Hougoumont* arrivals and did notice some information where the individual was described as an EPG.

Considerable time has been spent on David Barker's book "Warders and Gaoler's", looking at those members he believes to be Enrolled Pensioner Guards. This is an ongoing project and will continue for some time.

What research to do between now and the end of the year. Look at the wives and children of the Guards. Try and work out an easier system of locating information about our Irish born guards to obtain information about wives, children, fathers and mothers.

William Stuart (Stewart) Jones

Of the 1st Battalion Rifle Brigade

William S Jones was the son of William George and Mary Ann Jones of King's County, Ireland. He was born c1818. At 34years of age, he married Mary Jane Young, daughter of building contractor William and Mary Young of Belfast. Where they were married differs on both their death certificates. His shows King's County (Offally) while hers shows Belfast. William was a soldier being a veteran of the Crimea (18541856)

- 6 Oct 1869 purchased Fremantle Town Lot 700 for £6.0s.0d.
- 2 Sep 1883 Granted North Fremantle Locations P43 and P44 of 2.2.27 acres.¹

On 25 June 1897 William was entertained at a banquet for EPF survivors, held in St George's Hall, Perth, as part of Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations where he was shown as being a holder of Crimea and Turkish Crimea medals.

William Stewart Jones and his wife Mary Jane raised a family eventually consisting of five daughters and three sons. At the conclusion of William's military service, the family was involved in a Wood Merchants business on the corner of Hampton Road and South Street, and a Laundry business in South Street, with property in South Street and Attfield Street in Fremantle. The family attended St Paul's Church of England in Hampton Road, Beaconsfield, with their

children's schooling at a building in Baker Street.

From the Fremantle City Library Local Studies Collection the Rate Books of 1887 show that an undeveloped lot in South Street was owned by W Jones. Whereas the Rate Books of 1888-1890 describes the property as "Cottage of 4 rooms in South Street owned by William Jones – Pensioner."

By 1897 the Rate Books show that William owned three properties, a 3 room and a 4 room cottage in Attfield Street and South Street. Those records then show that in 1898 the South Street cottage now has 7 rooms.

William Stewart Jones passed away on 1st January 1899 at his home in Attfield Street, South Fremantle, aged 80 years. He was buried in the Church of England Cemetery at Skinner Street, Fremantle on the 2nd January 1899 and these records were substantiated by the Parish Burial records of St John's Anglican Church, Fremantle.²

The John Curtin High School now stands on this site. The headstones from here were transferred to the current Fremantle

Cemetery on the corner of High Street and Carrington Street, Fremantle.

Mary Jane Jones passed away on the 14th May 1925, at her sons home called The Oval Cottage, aged 91 years, just 6 weeks short of her 92nd birthday. Mary was buried in the Church of England Section of Fremantle Cemetery in Plot A3.495.

On a visit to the cemetery we could not locate the Skinner Street headstone in the special section set aside for them. Mary's gravesite carries a headstone, inscribed:

> "Our dear father W S Jones Crimean Veteran Died Jan 1899, Aged 81 Also our dear mother, Mary Jones Died May 14, 1935, Aged 92"

Clara died aged 10yrs in 1888 Christiana other possibly being (the registered in 1869 aged 9mths).

Editorial Note: (Beryl Dancer has kindly shared her many years of research into her family history with us from an unpublished manuscript that she has done for her family who said that all her information will all be lost if she didn't put pen to paper. - How right is that.

Beryl actually remembers living in the cottage inside the gates of Fremantle Oval because her father was the caretaker. The Oval was muted by the Fremantle Football Club and the Cricket Club in 1893. They were said to want the "Barracks Field" for a public recreation area. This used to be the parade ground for the Enrolled Pensioners who were in the nearby Barracks. The grounds then became the parade grounds for Volunteer Defence Corps under the auspices of C A Manning. This idea was objected to by Sir John Forrest but by June 1894 the councillors were granted this land. The first football game was played there in May of 1894.

James & Cornelius Callaghan or O'Callaghan – Are they Brothers??

As part of my general family history research I was pleased to find my Great Great Grandfather was an Enrolled Pensioner Guard. He, with his wife, daughter & son arrived in the Swan River Colony on the "Merchantman 1" in Feb 1863. He is listed in the Passenger List as James Callaghan aka John O'Callaghan and all subsequent references to him and his descendants in the Colony are as O'Callaghans.

While I had discovered a significant amount of information about them in the Colony I had little success tracing their roots in Ireland. Everything pointed to Cork but little else was known. It was clear that I had to locate a copy of James Attestation Papers which would contain his place of birth etc..

Initially I lived in Dianella and used the WAGS and SLWA Resources. Upon moving to Madeley in 2005 I switched to the Warwick Family History Centre where I was fortunate to meet up with Gillian O'Mara, a volunteer at the Centre and an enthusiastic knowledgeable EPG researcher. With her assistance I continued to look for the Attestation Papers. 18 Microfilm Reels, WO 97, 120, 118 & 11 AJPC Reels later, by the beginning of this year I still had not located the Papers, however, we had found a likely candidate in the Kilmainham Pensioners Admissions in James Callaghan born in St Nicholas Parish Cork, c1823.

Then there began an interesting series of coincidences.

Gillian had drawn to my attention that Attestation Papers were now available on-line via "findmypast.com" and that access was freely available at Warwick FHC. By a time consuming process of elimination of Callaghan/O'Callaghans records, I eventually

found my James, who neatly cross referenced with the Kilmainham record

In July 2010 Leslie Singleton, a descendant of EPG Cornelius Callaghan, followed up on a request in a 2009 Newsletter to provide EPG stories. She provided all the information she had collected on Cornelius. He was born in St Peters Parish Cork in 1820, only a short distance from St Nicholas. He arrived in the Colony in 1853 as an EPG aboard the "Robert Small" with his wife. Leslie's notes came to the notice of Gillian via Beth Smith and she recognised a possible connection with my James. At our next EPG meeting she showed me Leslie's results.

Shortly after this meeting I visited in Hospital my dying Aunt aged 90, the last of my Fathers O'Callaghan generation. Her 3 children, normally scattered throughout the State, were at her bedside and our conversation turned to family history. One of my cousins said Aunty had on several occasions said that our EPG had a brother here in the Colony. This was the first I had heard of him.

On returning home I sent Leslie an email, which she received just as she was leaving Bussellton to visit her sister in Madeley. When she arrived at her sisters she mentioned my email, to which her sister replied "there's a Richard O'Callaghan living in this Village". I was only a stones throw away. She immediately rang me but we didn't physically catch-up as in a few days we were off overseas and she back to Busselton.

We now both have our Attestation Papers but are not yet much further in confirming a family connection. There's a cluster of Parishes in central Cork City. As well as St Nicholas & St Peter there are Holy Trinity, St Paul, St Anne Shandon & St Michael. The Griffith Valuation of 1853 show all of these Parishes to be full of Callaghans & O'Callaghans, so we still have the job ahead of us to prove the connection. Having two members of the same family to work with will hopefully assist in locating the rest of their family, Parents etc


